TAIWAN OPENS ITS DOORS TO AUSTRALIAN STUDENTS 2024 APAIE IN PERTH, AUSTRALIA

Delegates from Taiwan's diplomatic and Academic establishment attended the Asia Pacific Association for International Education (APAIE) 2024 in Perth from the 4th - 8th of March on a mission to promote international exchanges within the Asia-Pacific region.

Approximately 70 representatives from 29 Taiwan higher education institutions attended APAIE. Dr Cheng-Chih Wu, the Chairperson of the Foundation for International Cooperation in Higher Education of Taiwan (FICHET), led the delegation, showcasing Study-in-Taiwan opportunities.

The theme of the Study in Taiwan pavilion at APAIE was "Taiwan, the Technology Hub," highlighting Taiwan's research strengths in key areas - semiconductors, AI, circular economy, biotechnology and medicine.

Taiwan, the Technology Hub

Taiwan stands out for its advancements in STEM research and industries, particularly in the vital semiconductor sector. Taiwan has launched a bold new plan to engage with international students with attractive incentives to study and then work in Taiwan in one of the world's leading industries.

Taiwan Night: A Dynamic Platform fostering Cross-Border Ties

On 6 March, FICHET and TECO co-hosted "Taiwan Night" for 110 educators from Asia-Pacific, Europe, and North America, where Taiwanese universities had connected with key partner universities and foster academic networking.

COLLABORATING FOR SUSTAINABLE IMPACT: PARTNERSHIPS ACROSS THE ASIA PACIFIC

Taiwan's Chief Representative to Australia, Amb. Douglas Yu-tien Hsu, along with Ms Jill Lai, executive director of Education Division and Dr Ho Lin, executive director of Science & Technology Division from TECO in Australia, visited the Study in Taiwan booth at APAIE on 5 of March. Following in the evening, Amb. Hsu hosted a banquet to celebrate the delegation's work in promoting international education cooperation.

APAIE was established 20 years ago, and this year's conference marked the 17th annual conference. This year's theme is "Collaborating for sustainable impact: partnerships across the Asia Pacific," and over 2,500 delegates from various countries attended.

Taiwan's Ministry of Education has focused on talent development, especially for nations involved in Taiwan's New Southbound Policy. Tailored programs and engaging international students have played a significant role in fostering successful and enduring collaborations.

National Tsing Hua University vs. Macquarie University

After APAIE in Perth, a notable advance in international higher education collaboration was achieved as Taiwan's National Tsing Hua University and Australia's Macquarie University agreed on a Cotutelle Ph.D. degree partnership. This collaboration will be in effect starting from 11 March, 2024. Students will have the opportunity to obtain a Ph.D. from both institutions by fulfilling the study requirement of both universities.

Additionally, institutional partnerships between Taiwan and Australia include:

- Aboriginal studies collaboration between Western Sydney University and the National Dong Hwa University
- Educational MOU between the University of Melbourne and National Taiwan Normal University focusing on postgraduate studies in global Aboriginal and contemporary Chinese studies starting in 2023.

When applying for the Ministry of Education's Huayu Enrichment Scholarship, selecting a language centre is crucial. With 64 Mandarin learning centers available in the north, south, central, and east regions of Taiwan, how can you assess and compare these centers to make the best choice?

Luckily, Damian has conducted a preview for us during his exchange to Taiwan, exploring two language centers – one in north Taipei and the other in south Tainan.

DEFINE YOUR OBJECTIVES & PREFERENCES

Before diving into the websites and brochures of all language centers, it's essential to outline your trip's requirements. Determine your budget, preferred destination, and must-haves. Decide on areas where you are willing to make compromises and those that are nonnegotiable. By clarifying your goals and preferences, you can narrow down your choices and focus on the one that aligns with your criteria.

- General Chinese (twice a week)
- Enhancing Chinese (twice a week)
- Elective classes

- 7 levels of classes

ICL (International Companions for Learning)

- Plenty of food options on campus
- Student clubs/associations

National Cheng Kung University-Tainan

More emphasis on traditional Chinese 繁體字

- Smaller classes
- better for learning and making connections with people in your class to practice
- 5 days a week for 2 hours
- Added elective classes (pick minimum of 3)
- 9 levels of classes
- Cultural tours and excursions
- Immersive language buddy experience to practice Chinese
- Easier admin and points of contact
- Plenty nearby street food

Understanding this, at O-week (aka orientation week) Taiwanese Students Associations (TSA) organised welcome party and activities to help members socialise, have fun, and make new friends while engaging in talks or gatherings.

TSA aims to serve as a community for all its members who have an affection for Taiwan, providing a platform for connection and enjoyment. Additionally, TSA partnered with the Education Division at TECO in Australia to organise a Study-in-Taiwan workshop in their campus.

At Macquarie University, Ms. Jill Lai was invited to present 'study-in-Taiwan' to introduce scholarship opportunities offered by the Ministry of Education in Taiwan. Following the floor was taken by Dr Men-fen Kuo, Damian and John, Macquarie facuty/ students as guest speakers.

Damian showcased his authentic study and living experience in Taiwan back in 2023. Additionally, it entailed his Mandarin learning journey in Taipei and Tainan.

Another information session, overseen by Professor Benjamin Penny, took place on 26 March at the China in the World (CIW) of Australian National University (ANU) with assistance provided by ANU TSA. Dr Alison Darby, recipient of the 2023 MOE Huayu Enrichment Scholarship and a visiting fellow at the College of Asia & the Pacific, participated online to discuss her learning journey right after her Mandarin class at National Taiwan Normal University.

She emphasised how intensive classes played a key role in enhancing her skills in an immersive language environment.

NATIONAL CHENG KUNG UNIVERSITY, TAINAN




- No metro system

- 2 beds per room
- Most likely with international or local students
- 5 minutes walk to Gongguan station

National Taiwan University (NTU), Taipei


